As Dolores sat there in shock, Vernon stepped out on the deck with a lovely lady on his arm. The lady was definitely not Yolanda, his wife.


"Juan, who is that woman with Vernon?" Dolores asked.

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

The Mountain Pine Ridge Forest Reserve is nestled within the Cayo District of south-central Belize. Covering an expanse of more than 106 thousand acres, the reserve is primarily pine forest with its fair share of broadleaf forest and grassland areas. Replete with majestic waterfalls, rumbling rivers, vast cave systems, misty mountains and amazing creatures large and small, this area is the perfect playground for those who love the serenity of nature and have a thirst for adventure. With so much to see and do, where do you rest your weary body after an exhilarating day of exploration? There are a handful of resort properties within the reserve, each exceptional in their unique way, but one that stands alone in stellar location and hospitality is the one and only Gaïa Riverlodge.

Perched above a breathtaking view of the dramatic Five Sisters Waterfalls, this intimate resort is a lush compound of thatched cabañas and suites that offer your choice of garden, mountain, waterfall or riverside views. Charming and warm, the rooms have expansive vistas, delicious beds topped with netted canopies and fluffy duvets when the mountain air has a chill, and every creature comfort is met with thoughtful attention. Add the dull thunder of the waterfalls below, paired with birdsong and the buzz of the surrounding forest, and the stage is set for enjoying nature at her finest. Only in the main lodge can you connect to the internet; there is no place for televisions or phones in this wild abode. Here you disconnect from the troubles of the 'real' world, and as you unplug, you are gently persuaded to linger in the lull of the forest.

When you're not busy relaxing,

adventure awaits you at your doorstep. The first thing to explore? The Five Sisters Waterfalls that you have admired from the terraced levels of the main lodge above. Depending on how active you want to be, you can add the steep stairway to the riverbed to your daily workout regime or opt to take the little tram that the nice people at Gaïa have installed for the less motivated (like me) or unable guests. At the base of the waterfalls lies an expansive pool, complete with a sandy beach, gazebo, lounge chairs and thatched shade where you can bask in the sun and enjoy a cool swim. With trails along the river, there's plenty

of areas to explore and other natural pools to swim in a while being one with the wild.

Other adventures that originate on-site include mountain biking, hiking, early morning jungle walks, birding, and even a nocturnal rainforest walk. Our most ambitious activity? A guided hike and exploration of the nearby Xibalba cave. According to my handy-dandy Fitbit, throughout the five hours, we covered close to five miles and logged more than 12,000 steps. Along the way, our very knowledgeable guide Isael Mai stops and points out plants and insects of interest. From the cohune palm where the heart



of the plant is a delicacy, to small trails worn through the forest by busy leaf-cutting ants to admiring large termite nests that look like big brown warts growing on trees, it is a fascinating trek. Isael even invites us to eat a termite, claiming they taste like mint! My comadre Mary is brave enough to sample one, and she agrees they'd make a delicious Moiito - ha!

Once we reach the entrance of the cave, we don helmets, headlamps, and flashlights as we take a short ladder into the dark abyss. I have to admit I'm intimidated by the idea of the enclosed space,




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


but decide to brave it anyway. Inside Isael tells us about the ancient Maya and how they revered the mysterious caves. Along the way we see pottery shards from deep within the massive cave where stalactites and stalagmites meet, forming impressive natural columns and expansive ceilings sparkle with glitter-like minerals. Back we go into total darkness, sometimes squeezing through tight places, almost a quarter mile. It's an exhilarating and even scary adventure, but amazing and worth overcoming any fears you may have! On our return to the lodge, Little Vaqueros Falls invites us to swim, but the cool temperatures and light rain finds us looking for a warm shower instead.


On another day we venture off-site in our Crystal Auto rental car and drive to the Caracol Archeological Site. It is an all-day expedition over rough dirt roads deep with potholes and mud. We spend hours exploring Caracol while Howler Monkeys growl in the treetops. It is the largest Maya site in Belize, and we are breathless when we top the Caana pyramid. The panoramas from the top are worth the effort it takes to scale the massive structure! On our way back, we explore the impressive Rio Frio cave (right) and enjoy a superb picnic lunch packed by our friends at Gaïa. It's a perfect day indeed.

After you've spent a day exploring unknown territory you are sure to have a mighty thirst and a hearty appetite. Bartender/hero Derby at the main lodge is happy to mix up cold libations like refreshing ginger Mojitos, specialty Martinis or cocktails made with tropical fruit juices, yum! When its time to eat, meals can be either be enjoyed on one of the outside terraces or inside the lodge. With much of the vegetables sourced from their own garden, breakfast, lunch, and dinner are full of fresh flavors, and their menu is mindful of those who prefer meatless dishes. There's something for everyone, one-night I enjoy a delicious Eggplant Parmigiana while the next I devour some of the best tenderloin steak I've had in Belize.



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

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

A Taste of Nature: Gaïa Riverlodge serves up fresh eats

"E'le'lah ki yete he'. Ka tza'hik - yan a pa'tik u tikin tah — wah ma pa'tik u tikin tah, ma'a ki' ku ho'k'o." Mr. Samuel Mai was instructing me on how to fry up water spinach with eggs. I was nibbling away at a leaf he'd plucked from the vine climbing up its trellis, while he explained that the spinach had to cook down, till it was 'dry' (tikin), then, and only then, should you add the eggs — otherwise, it's not good or tasty. Oh, and yes, he was telling me this in our native Yucatec Mayan as he gave me a tour of the beautiful garden at Gaïa Riverlodge in the Mountain Pine Ridge.

Returning home is one of the few experiences that gives me complete and utter joy. I totally forget about the 'real' world as I immerse myself wholly into enjoying the fresh mountain air, eating the freshest of produce while both listening to, and speaking, my beloved Mayan language. Mr. Sam had greeted us as we arrived at Gaīa, immediately recognizing me and thus he addressed me in our native language from the get-go. I was thrilled, as I never get a chance to dust off my linguistics on the island, and they say practice makes perfect. Then I learned that he oversaw the garden from which 60%-75% of the resort's food came from.

Thus, I took a walk-through rows and trellises, learning about each different plant, tasting what he handed me, without question. From Cuban mint to spearmint and the standard, to peppery arugula and mustard greens, kale, lettuce and my very own sweet pepper - I was having a salad for breakfast and didn't even know it! I crunched happily away at the snap peas, regular peas, string beans (of varying colors), and even tasted sorrel/wild hibiscus. I held firm against radishes and celery (my most hated veggies). My envious eyes practically watered at the green soursop, starfruit, oranges, grapefruits and mango blossoms. I almost cried seeing the pineapples lying on their side, having fallen victim to bird attacks. All along the way, Mr. Sam explained the organic process of keeping the plants growing and thriving, without using chemical fertilizers. He showed me fruiting lime trees that he worked on hybridizing – their fruit growing in beautiful bunches and soon ready for that salad dressing or to give the Mojito its classic tang.

Every meal we ate at Gaïa during our threenight stay was full of flavor and bright with fresh vegetables and fruits. From a platter of fresh fruit to start off breakfast, with a side of gorgeous, fresh-squeezed orange juice, to some of the crunchiest, tastiest sautéed vegetables accompanying our meats and starches, we were in foodie heaven. Being in the Cayo District, where fruits and vegetables grow in abundance, it's no surprise that every meal at Gaïa is literally farm to table! We certainly savored every bite.



basket and your choice of a yummy entre!



The Cinnamon Stuffed French Toast sounds decadent too — with strawberry cream cheese and bananas, a side of bacon and maple syrup? Um, yes please! But they don't stop there, you can also have a Breakfast Quesadilla — a warm flour tortilla is stuffed with eggs, bacon, peppers, onions and cheese, then topped with avocado and pico de gallo and sour cream. Talk about a hearty option. If you're watching your diet, you can try Juan's Country Salad, which is still satisfying with seasoned potatoes, shredded cheese and avocado topping mixed greens with a mix of tomatoes, onions, grilled corn and black bean salsa. Parades, Dancing, and Colorful Paints: This is how we celebrate!



Keeping the tradition alive, plans for the El Gran Carnaval de San Pedro are already underway! The usual celebration to usher in the Lenten Season has been extended to five days of cultural fun, music, and dance.

Mark your calendars for Saturday, March 2nd for the start of the festivities with the first ever Carnaval Parade. Starting at 5PM, colorfully decorated floats with a trail of dancers will parade down town core as they make their way to Central Park for the annual Carnaval Fiesta. "What to expect at the fiesta?" — Delicious local food, ice cold drinks and cocktails and the best live entertainment in town!

Carnaval festivities continue with three days of unadulterated revelry. The traditional painting starts at 1PM on Sunday, Monday, and Tuesday within Barrier Reef Drive and the adjacent beach. Also making their debut will be the several groups of comparsas dancers who for the past year have been perfecting their songs and dance routines especially for the 2019 Carnaval.

Closing off El Gran Carnaval will be the burning of Juan Carnaval on Wednesday, March 6th at 7PM. Gather along the beach in front of Central Park and be witness to the reading of the Last Will and Testament of Juan Carnaval, the infamous womanizer.





Please note that there are some rules and regulations upheld during the celebrations: It is recommended that only children paint on Sunday. NO painting of comparsa participants, properties, signs, vehicles, and people in uniform or coming from work; no oil paint or spray paint; no bottle squeezers will be allowed; no throwing of eggs or use of rotten eggs; painters are asked to respect tourists unless they want to participate. The painting zones are: beach front from Ruby's Hotel to the cemetery area and Barrier Reef Drive. Non-painters are recommended to avoid the painting zones. Barrier Reef Drive will be closed to all vehicular traffic, and no parking will be allowed on either Barrier Reef Drive or Pescador Drive between 1PM to 7PM on all Carnaval days. There is just something about food cooked over an open flame that makes it ten times better for me. Maybe it's the cultural significance, knowing that our grandmothers and great-grandmothers labored outside on the fogon (fire hearths) to provide delicious meals for their families? Or maybe it's that unique smoky taste that can only be achieved from cooking on an open fire? Whatever it may be, fogon cooking has a special place in the hearts (and stomachs) of Belizeans. From our coconut rice and beans to our soups, it's always better when it's cooked this way! One classic favorite is the Escabeche a savory chicken soup with lots of onions! On a fogon, the chicken is roasted before dunking it into its tart, flavorful broth filled with sweet onions. If you don't have a fire hearth, a good broil will give the chicken that crispy skin so loved in escabeche.

Ingredients:

- Whole chicken, cut into serving sizes
- 6-8 dried oregano leaves
- 8-10 All-spice seeds
- Vinegar or sour oranges if available
- · Salt
- · Black pepper
- · Chicken consommé
- 6-8 bay leaves
- · 3lbs large white onions
- Jalapeño peppers (can be canned but preferably fresh)

Instructions:

 Clean chicken by soaking in water and vinegar.



- Placed in large pot along with salt, pepper and chicken consommé to taste, oregano leaves, all-spice seeds and bay leaves.
- Add enough water to cover chicken and bring to a boil for about 20 – 25 minutes.
- While chicken is boiling, peel and cut white onions into rings and set aside.
- 5. Once chicken is cooked, remove and let cool.
- Add the cut onions to the chicken broth along with whole jalapenos and vinegar (or the juice of sour oranges) to desired tartness and let simmer.
- Once the chicken is cool enough to handle, either deep fry in oil, broil in oven, or roast in a grill over open flames.
- The soup is finished cooking once it is boiling or when the onions are soft to the touch.
- 9. Serve the onion soup along with a piece of chicken and jalapeno. Best enjoyed while hot with fresh corn tortillas. (Some weird people, like our Associate Editor Mary, prefer it with white rice, but she's a strange one!)

Oh well, on to another item on my list – let's see how I fare!




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
Where in Belize?


Despite its relatively small square mileage, a lot of Belize remains a mystery. There are so many hidden nooks that may never be discovered by all. We can't tell you how often it is we take the wrong turn down a dirt road, only to find ourselves feeling like we're in a whole new world. 
