
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The Belize Zoo at 40! A Reflection on Four Decades of Wildlife Conservation

Sharon Matola founded the Belize Zoo (TBZ) after caring for a handful of wild animals that had been part of a natural history documentary. In 1983, when the filming finished, she was left with these animals and decided to start a zoo. Over the next four decades, Sharon and her team transformed the backyard zoo into a world-renowned wildlife education center where visitors connect with Belize's unique natural heritage: the animals.

Some have captured the hearts and minds of multiple generations of visitors. April, the tapir, the zoo's first and most famous animal ambassador, touched lives for 30 years through her annual birthday celebrations. She paved the way for future ambassadors, including Junior Buddy the jaguar, Panama, the harpy eagle, Rose the crocodile, and Neo, the river otter.



In keeping with its origins, all the animals at The Belize Zoo are rescued, confiscated from the illegal wildlife trade by law enforcement, transferred from other rehab facilities, or born there. Habitats are designed to reflect the animal's natural settings and provide an immersive educational experience for thousands of Belizeans and international visitors annually.


Students from all over Belize have enjoyed field trips to the zoo. For many, it is their first positive encounter with the fascinating wildlife of their country. The Education Department provides fun, hands-on activities for students while they learn about the animals. The zoo has delivered a range of engaging programs over the years, such as science fairs, animal birthday parties, and open days.

In seeking new ways to allow visitors to appreciate the natural world, the Tropical Education Center (TEC) was established in 1991 as an extension of the Belize Zoo. It accommodates a dining hall, library, lecture hall, and nature trails. The TEC provided some of the first naturalist training sessions for tour guides and professional seminars for primary school teachers. For over 25 years, it has hosted hundreds of Belizean teens in the longest-running conservation summer camp.




For schools unable to visit the zoo, outreach educational programs provided a solution in the early days, and the programs remain a pillar of TBZTEC's education strategy, concentrating on current environmental issues or a species-focused approach to help reduce human-wildlife conflict.

As Belize's oldest wildlife rehabilitation facility, TBZTEC has provided veterinary care for a diversity of wildlife and supported the reintroduction of species such as harpy eagles, jaguars, jabiru storks, howler monkeys, silky anteaters, barn owls, and Morelet's crocodiles.

Part of TBZTEC's mission is to protect Belize's wildlife and their habitats. In recent years, TBZTEC has focused on strengthening landscape

> conservation work in the Maya Forest Corridor. This last connection between Belize's most significant forest blocks allows the free movement of wildlife, reducing human-wildlife conflict.

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Aces Wildlife Rescue - where wild creatures in need get a second chance

Aces Wildlife Rescue is a 24/7 emergency wildlife response team, rehabilitation facility, and sanctuary nestled in the heart of Ambergris Caye. Originally centered on crocodile conservation, the organization has undergone a remarkable transformation to meet the growing demand for general wildlife assistance on the island. By expanding their skills, knowledge base, and qualifications, they have committed themselves to serving their community and the various wildlife species of the Cayes.

Before the onset of the COVID-19 pandemic, ACES noticed a



surge in calls related to distressed wildlife of different species. These creatures arrived at their doorstep in deplorable conditions - dehydrated and malnourished. In the past, the organization could only offer a safe and quiet haven for these animals until they could be transported to suitable facilities on the mainland. Unfortunately, the journey often exacerbated their already deteriorating health, leading to the demise of many creatures. Determined to improve the situation, the team resolved to raise their standards of care, especially for species unfamiliar to them, ensuring a better chance of recovery and successful release into the wild.

To achieve this goal, they embarked on immersive training both domestically and internationally. Christina, Aces' lead wildlife rehabber, visited numerous facilities to study their standards and protocols. She collaborated with experienced rehabbers, consulted wildlife veterinarians, and pursued courses in wildlife stabilization, fluid therapy, and rehabilitation through the International Wildlife Rehabilitation Council. This effort enabled them to understand the unique needs of temporarily captive wildlife, facilitating recovery and allowing them to foster natural behaviors

essential for survival in their natural habitats.

Remarkably, Aces now boasts ten rehabilitative enclosures designed to cater to a diverse range of species. Over time, they have cared for warblers, pelicans, boa constrictors, iguanas, toucans, parrots, and turtles, among others. These enclosures have become vital sanctuaries where injured or orphaned wildlife can heal and regain their strength.

Deeply rooted in their community, Aces is immensely grateful to all those who have contributed to their transformation into a multi-species wildlife rescue organization. With continuous growth and improvement, their unwavering commitment to providing the highest standard of care for all animals under their care remains steadfast. Every creature that finds its way to Aces is granted a second chance at life in the wild, thanks to the compassionate individuals who form an integral part of the community and who promptly report animals in distress.

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





The Carnival Road March, to be held on September 9th, brings color and energetic vibes to the streets of Belize City. On Independence Day, grand parades are held across the country, including San Pedro Town.

A full schedule of all events will be released as we near September, so be on the lookout. All are welcome to participate in Belize's festive celebrations, so don't hesitate to join the fun.

Halloween; a holiday that marks the day before the Western Christian feast of All Saints, or All Hallows, and initiates the season of Allhallowtide. While it may be celebrated worldwide on October 31st, with many people dressing in spooky costumes and giving out candy, it also holds significant traditions in many local cultures. October 31st is part of the traditional el Dia de Los Muertos or Los Finados. Prominently celebrated in Mexico, the Maya or Mestizo of Belize also celebrate this date as the day to celebrate the cycle of life and death. On this day, families observing this tradition set up altars to honor their ancestors, both those remembered and those long forgotten. Many believe the tradition dates to the ancient Maya, who believed there is life after death. Altars are lit up with candles,

decorated with flowers, and offerings foods and drinks.

The tradition also extends to November 1st and 2nd, with a celebration rooted in Catholic beliefs. Those of the Catholic Faith honor 1st November as all Saints Day to commemorate infants and young children that have passed away. November 2nd is Dia de los Muertos and honors adults who have died. Local Catholic churches host a special Mass and processions to the cemetery. Families visit the graves of their loved ones to say prayers and place flowers, wreaths, food, and drinks. Many families also take the time to prepare special local dishes once favored by their departed loved ones. Celebrating death is an integral part of the Belizean culture, rooted in tradition and love for family.

The lighter side of October 31: Let's talk Halloween fun!

Halloween is also a time for light-hearted fun with trick-or-treating and plenty of themed parties. One of our favorite events is Saga's Halloween Spooktacular. A fundraising event for San Pedro's local Humane Society, the Halloween Pet Costume contest and party is fun for the whole family. It was a festival of ghosts, monsters, and adorable pups; you will surely have a good time, all while supporting the island's most vulnerable population.
