My name is Wally Nuñez, Mayor of San Pedro Town, and I extend the most heartfelt welcome to the beautiful island of Ambergris Caye.



Snorkeling 101: BE PREPARED FOR YOUR AQUATIC ADVENTURE! Snorkeling is more like floating than swimming and offers an easy and relaxing alternative to diving. It's a perfect way to discover our Meso-American Reef System's magical underwater world, abundant with marine life and stunning coral formations. By Tamara Sniffin

They say it's good to occasionally step out of your comfort zone and challenge yourself to do something new. For many visiting our beautiful Belize, exploring our stellar underwater world is a must. If you've never donned a snorkel mask and fins, or it's been a while, making your first jump off the side of a boat into the deep blue can be a tad intimidating. Why not do a little homework before making the most of your aquatic adventure?

Wherever you are staying, chances are your accommodations rent/loan snorkel gear or a dive shop nearby. Being prepared and comfortable in your gear can prevent annoying, if not stressful, distractions and allow for a more enjoyable experience.



SNORKEL MASK

Testing the snorkel mask for proper fit is crucial. Your goal is to have an airtight seal, and you should be able to see everything around you clearly while maintaining comfort.

- To get that airtight fit, push your hair back, place the mask firmly onto your face, inhale through your nose, and then let go. If the mask stays on without you holding on, then it is properly sealed, and water will not enter your mask.
- If water is still coming in when fully submerged, adjust the straps on the back of the mask. If your mask is too tight after adjusting the band behind your head, you may need a larger mask. A too tight mask can hurt after a while (and you want to be out there for hours having fun). Keep testing masks until you find one with a proper fit.

- · After determining which mask is a proper fit, wash the mask thoroughly with biodegradable soap and freshwater; this prevents your mask from fogging during your swim.
- Did you know many dive shops provide prescription snorkel masks? If you depend on glasses for better vision, these can be a game changer in your submerged adventure.
- Another mask option is a full-face mask, eliminating the snorkel tube.

SNORKEL TUBE

The tub is attached to the side of your mask and moves flexibly. Gently bite on the snorkel's mouthpiece, letting your lips seal around it, holding it in place. Breathe slowly and deeply through your mouth. No need to panic, you can always lift your head above water! You can hear your breathing through the snorkel and get into a rhythm while you gently kick your feet.

FINS

Make sure you find fins that fit just right; do not compromise! If the fins are too large, you will have trouble keeping them on during your swim, and if they are too small, you'll be so uncomfortable you won't enjoy the swim either! It is best to put your fins before getting into the water. If you must walk in them, turn around, and move backward, it's much easier than putting the first flipper forward!

TIME TO GET IN THE WATER

Once your equipment fits properly and is comfortable, it's time for a test drive! Using a swimming pool or wading into the shallow beachside is a good start if you are a beginner. If you don't have that option, take a practice snorkel close to the boat to test all the equipment before venturing out.

ALWAYS REMEMBER

Just relax. Sometimes, first-timers will panic a bit, and that will cause you to over-exert yourself and wear out too quickly. Snorkeling is a safe way to enjoy your vacation, and you will find that the more you relax and let yourself glide through the water, the more enjoyable time you will have.

- Always stay with your group; do not stray from your guide.
- Do not stand on or break the coral.
- Do not pick up shells for souvenirs; they could be someone's home.
- Always go with a certified tour guide and operator.

Belize Barrier Reef Watch

Many who enjoy the underwater experience, be it diving or snorkeling, are eager to learn more about this submerged world of beauty and be a part of protecting it. Here's one way to help: be a Belize Barrier Reef Watch Citizen Scientist by documenting reef health and diversity!

The Belize Barrier Reef Watch is one of many programs within Belize dedicated to protecting the Belize Barrier Reef Reserve System, which was declared a UNESCO World Heritage Site for its Outstanding Universal Value in 1996.

Founded initially as the Mesoamerican Coral Reef Watch Program in 2008, the program responded to numerous observations of coral bleaching in Mexico, Belize, and Honduras. The Nature Conservancy and the World Wildlife Fund led the initiative. In Belize, the program is coordinated by ECOMAR, a Belize Coral Watch Network member organization.

In 2022, the Belize Coral Watch Program was revitalized as the Belize Barrier Reef Watch Program. The restored program has several goals, one being the Citizen Science program, where everyone from tourists, coastal residents, fishers, tour guides, resorts, dive and snorkel centers, non-governmental organization researchers, and government departments can submit reports based on the Belize Barrier Reef Watch List.

The "Watch List"

The Belize Barrier Reef is a diverse ecosystem that has supported Belize for centuries. Scientists and rangers are in the field daily monitoring use and health, but many sites are not regularly monitored. The Watch List includes critical attributes of the marine ecosystem in Belize. The level is geared towards the Citizen Scientist, but field reports from fishers, tourism industry representatives, NGOs, and researchers are welcome.



Twenty-four categories are monitored and documented. The list includes marine life, marine debris, commercial fishery products, and iconic megafauna, from the shore to the reef, through the ocean, to the territorial borders of Belize.

As a Citizen Scientist, you can report on all categories or select your favorites, the ones you are most passionate about, and share those reports.

The information received is used to create the Belize Barrier Reef Annual Report, identifying resilient reefs or Hope Spots, document rare species, document nesting turtles, and engage coastal residents on how to support the efforts of the dedicated personnel charged with managing and monitoring the Belize Barrier Reef.

To submit a report, please go to Belize Barrier Reef Watch https://www.belizebarrierreef. org/submit-report.html. Once you submit a report of your reef observations, a team member will reach out with any additional questions. Thank you for your support and concern for the Belize Barrier Reef Ecosystem and for volunteering with ECOMAR and the Belize Barrier Reef Watch Program!



Edward "Papo" Alamilla's realism art depicts Belize's natural beauty



The winning painting is incredibly detailed, and includes well-known island fisherman, Wilfredo Alamilla Sr. Papo said he wanted to highlight his fishing practices, while also capturing breathtaking vistas such as the Lighthouse Reef Atoll area and the mesmerizing Great Blue Hole. The painting also included a Maya Archaeological site, a cultural gem drawing tourists to its historical allure. Other features include the great Belize Barrier Reef and mangrove system, both havens for numerous fish species. The artwork also portrayed the magnificent Grand Slam related to fly-fishing, along with the untainted splendor of the jungle, the majestic jaguar, the vibrant Macaw, and Belize's national bird, the Toucan. The artwork also pays homage to the nation's agricultural abundance, portraying the cane industry and a local woman proudly displaying her bountiful harvest from the fertile land.

His award-winning masterpiece, 'Our People, Our Landscapes, Our Tourism,' captivated an esteemed panel of judges well-versed by showcasing the country's tourism landscape in all its beauty, including flora, fauna, and iconic attractions. Papo competed among 40 other artists nationwide and was one of the 19 submissions shortlisted.



Papo has even passed down his skills to his children, who have followed in his footsteps. The family's paintings are displayed for purchase at his art studio on Tarpon Street in downtown San Pedro. Are you ready? Carnaval is here again!



It's that time of year when San Pedro's island traditions come alive during the El Gran Carnaval. Painting, dance, and music fill the streets as we celebrate the five days before the Lenten Season.

Carnaval is one of the most joyful, fun, and entertaining festivals on Ambergris Caye, and this year, it kicks off on Saturday February 10th, with a grand Market Day at the Honorable Louis Sylvestre Sporting Complex. The following three days, from Sunday, February 11th to Tuesday, February 13th, the front street (Barrier Reef Drive) will see an explosion of color with the traditional painting and comparsas. If you are new to El Gran Carnaval de San Pedro, prepare yourself to turn into a human canvas, as during this time, participants paint one another in colorful hues of water and powder paint.

Most entertaining is enjoying the vibrant performances by the comparsas (dance groups) who parade around town performing choreographed original dances and songs. I am eager to see what the Cholo's Barbies have prepared this year! The Barbies, grown men dressed as women in heels, are always a hit! The last day of painting is always extra fun, with a DJ entertaining the crowd at Central Park.




The festival will end on Ash Wednesday, February 14th, with the traditional burning of Juan Carnaval. Culturally, the burning of Juan Carnaval signifies the cleansing of the community's sins and is believed to protect the island from misfortune during Lent.

Easter in La Isla Bonita

It isn't Easter in Belize without a good dose of sun, sand, and sea! The long holiday weekend starts on Holy Thursday, March 29th, and runs to Easter Monday, April 1st. Easter is Belize's most extended public holiday, and everyone flocks to the many coastal communities to relax or party with family and friends.

Here in San Pedro Town, it is one of the busiest times, with visitors from mainland Belize and abroad looking for clear skies, white beaches, and cool waters. Beach parties, concerts, and other social events happen throughout the weekend; everyone is invited. If you want to dance your holidays away, San Pedro is the place to be!



The Cayo District is a treasure trove of hidden gems. 

Screened windows are abundant, showcasing the wild landscape, with quaint porch areas to sit and commune with nature. A kerosene lantern illuminates the evening veranda, charming the dusky ambiance and shedding light on your door.

They say mountain air makes you hungry, but that also applies to the jungle! The inviting covered dining area is perched overlooking treetops and the ravine to the Macal River below. There's also a view of the bridge to the infinity pool that showcases a seamless illusion of cascading waters over the edge into the ascending jungle. The area also has world-class birding, with many to spot along your hikes. Birding guides are available to target birds you may not even notice and are well worth it for those passionate about their feathered friends.



Traditions rooted in religion:

Hot Cross Buns for Easter

Easter is a religious time for many Belizeans, especially Catholics, who see it as a time to strengthen their faith and family bonds through traditional activities.

From Sunday, March 24th to Sunday, March 31st, Christians across the country observe the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ. The week begins with the Palm Sunday Procession. Roman Catholic Churches in several municipalities re-enact Christ's triumphant entry into Jerusalem. Holy Monday's Procesion del Silencio and Holy Tuesday's Procesion de Encuentro reflect Christ's teachings. Good Friday features the Live Passion Play as streets are transformed into the Stations of the Cross, with local actors dramatizing Christ's trials, tribulations, and crucifixion. Masses are then held throughout the weekend on Saturday and Sunday to celebrate Christ's resurrection.

Another time-honored Easter tradition in many Belizean households is baking. Serving hot cross buns on Good Friday is a beautiful (and delicious) way to enjoy the day with family, filling the kitchen with sweet and fruity aromas! Dry

- * 3lbs flour
- * 2 packs of yeast
- * Spice seeds
- * Raisins
- * ½ lb shortening
- * 1 cup brown sugar

Wet


- * Lukewarm coconut milk
- * Vanilla (about one tablespoon)
- * Essence of your choice

Preparation Method:

- Add flour, yeast, spice seeds, and raisins into a mixing bowl.
- Add in the ½ lb of shortening, followed by 1 cup of brown sugar.
- Mix everything until incorporated.
- Pour in the lukewarm coconut milk until the dough starts coming together smoothly. You don't want too much milk to make the dough wet and sticky or too little milk that will make the dough stiff and dry.
 - While kneading the dough, add vanilla and whatever essence you have chosen and knead well.
 - Continue kneading until the dough is smooth and pliable.
 - Roll dough into medium-sized balls and set them on a baking sheet.
 - From the excess dough, cut two thin strips and make a cross across each bun.
 - Let the dough balls rise about 20 minutes.
 - When the dough has risen, place the baking sheet into the oven at 375oF and let bake for 20-25 minutes.


But, as anyone planning a wedding knows, research is vital, and getting married in a different country requires a little more work.

A marriage license at the cost of \$100 USD must be obtained before the ceremony, and the couple must be in the country at least three days before applying for the marriage license. However, it is possible to receive a Special License up to the day before the ceremony for \$250 USD. Ensure you have all your original legal documents, such as your passport and birth certificate. If previously married, have your divorce or spouse's death certificates on hand to prove you are eligible for remarriage. You will also need a Senior Justice of the Peach and two witnesses. Don't feel overwhelmed by the application process; wedding planners usually assist with this process so you can relax and prepare for your big day.

With all the procedures in place, all that is left is to get married! In Belize, either a Senior Justice of the Peace who has the authority to carry out wedding ceremonies or a priest, pastor, or minister of a registered church can perform a marriage. After the ceremony, the marriage will be registered at the Belize Registry Department, and you will receive your legally binding Marriage Certificate.
