Upe Nai Cultural Center – A "Dream" Come True

Authentic local food, Maya cooking classes, Manakin Birding Trail

For many cultures, Sunday family dinners are a tradition. It is a time set aside for loved ones, shared over favorite meals usually crafted by family matriarchs. For many Belizeans, this tradition holds true. What started as the usual family dinner on Sundays at the home of Philip and Leonila (Nila) Mai, Yucatec Mayas who live east of the picturesque San Antonio Village in the Cayo District, evolved into a culinary and cultural destination after the community gravitated to their authentic, fire-hearth cooking. As daughter Stephanie Martinez explained, "My lovely mama dreamed about this place called Upe Nai (a dream come true in Yucatec Mayan).



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She loves to cook, so we encouraged her to continue cooking the recipes she got from her mom, and now she is passing them on to me. I love learning from her, and she is happy that out of three sisters, I am the only one doing what she loves: cooking. Our goal is to keep the authentic traditional recipes and pass them on to other generations to come."



The roadside Upe Nai is nestled within lush jungle foliage under a covered, open-air dining area. The smoky aroma of burning wood, grilled meat, and tortillas hot off the comal permeates the ambiance, and the décor is splashed with bright Maya fabrics that cover the tables topped with vases of pink and white ginger blossoms. One side of the dining room is rowed with tables and fire hearths where bubbling caldrons of Caldo de Gallina, a very hearty chicken soup thick with locally sourced vegetables and spices, and Escabeche, a Mestizo

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onion soup with chicken and dotted with floating orange habanero peppers. Thin pork steaks sizzle in preparation of Poc Chuc, a signature Yucatec Maya dish, prepared in citrus marinade and grilled to perfection. The warm staff is equally colorful while Mama Nila beams from ear to ear as she flips handmade corn tortillas on the hot comal. Ms. Stehanie introduces us to the meal choices, letting us taste the soups as she drops a splash of deliciousness into our clean palms to slurp up. The bursts of flavors complicate picking which one will be lunch; it's all so good! Daily specials can also include pork pibil, tamales, tacos, and vegetarian options.

Sometimes, there are no words to describe the subtle seduction of culinary magic. Spiced with the warmth of smoky fire and laced with their secret ingredient, "LOVE," as Ms. Stephanie says, the meals are tremendously satisfying and flavorful. Not that it needs it, but their marinated red onion and diced habanero sauce adds a spicy kick! Refreshing iced all-spice or sorrel tea follows as the perfect thirst quencher.

Why not learn how to make your favorite dish? The lovely ladies at Upe Nai offer a half-day cooking class. The experience includes understanding the ancestors' way of preparing things from scratch, such as planting, shelling, cleaning, cooking, and grinding corn into masa. Masa is used in different ways, including making tortillas, salutes, Atole, tamales, and more. Participants then get to eat their culinary creations for lunch! It is recommended that you reserve your class two days in advance.

2.5 Miles South Open Tuesday to Saturday

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Discover the rich history of the island

Did you know that it is estimated that more indigenous Maya lived on Ambergris Caye than our current population of 20,000 people? Can you imagine the island dotted with thatched huts, salt processing sites, and coasts bustling with fishermen and dugout canoes laden with goods to trade? How about the day, decades later, when our Caribbean waters brought Spanish explorers and pirates to our beaches? All this, along with the fascinating historical timeline of Ambergris Caye, comes to life when you explore the Eco-Museum.

Founded by a lover of culture and local historian extraordinaire Mito Paz, this collection of island history is curated within an acre of landscaped trails that chronicle the island's history. In tours guided by Paz, visitors are immersed in a sense of re-living the past, where artifacts, displays, and interpretive signage transport you back in time.





explore the Ambergris Caye Eco–Museum

The trail begins with the ancient Maya, the island's first known inhabitants, with archaeological evidence dating to the Late Preclassic period, over 2,000 years ago. Along the way, their lifestyle is explored through a series of exhibits, where we learn about them as fishermen, traders, salt makers, hunters, and farmers and some of the gods they worshipped, Chaac Uayab Xoc, the Maya god of fishing and fishermen, and Ek Chuaj, the god of commerce and cocoa.

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History progresses along the trail, transitioning from the Maya to the Spanish conquest of the Americas, to the days of the Baymen and pirates, and the mid-1880s when the Blake/Andrade family settled on the island. The logging and chicle (chewing gum) industry follows, and we learn about the coconut plantations that started on the island in the late 1800s. The economy of Ambergris Caye shifted from coconuts to fishing, beginning in the late 1940s and now to modern-day tourism. Other exhibits display the origin of the island's name, "AMBERGRIS," the interesting Talking Cross (La Cruz Parlante), the Maya Cross (Maaya Katab Che'), and more.

The trail is not only an enchanting outdoor museum but also an opportunity to learn about the lush (and endangered) Littoral Forest and the local creatures such as the Yucatan Jay and Yucatan Squirrel. But the fun doesn't end there! The Eco Museum offers a variety of educational activities, such as authentic traditional Maya food cooked on an open-fire hearth (fogón), hands-on coconut husking and coconut oil-making, preparing traditional local meals, arts and crafts using coconut shells, and learning about Maya herbal medicine, to name a few.

The Eco Museum is a registered charity that helps to bring the history of Belize and Ambergris Caye alive. Visitors, school trips, educational workshops, and groups are welcome to visit the Eco Museum BY RESERVATION ONLY. Your small donation to the registered Non-profit Organization Green Reef Environmental Institute helps support the museum.

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Their signature style is ever present, from casual meals at the beachside Admiral Nelson's Bar to classy dining at Palmilla Restaurant. With impeccable attention to detail, it is no surprise that they have mastered the private dining experience, from candlelight beachside seating surrounded by twinkling lights and tiki torches to their overthe-water gazebo. Within this intimate setting, soft white curtains frame starlit night and moonglow, with warm ocean breezes awakening your senses. This is where wedding proposals are made, anniversaries are celebrated, another year of life is honored, and lifetime memories are anchored.

Our unforgettable evening at the pier gazebo starts with the lovely Ashley, who graciously attends to our every need. We began our meal with warm artisan bread with garlic-parsley butter and indulged in an Aperol Spritz and a tasty Bikini Martini, a delectable combination of coconut rum, vodka, pineapple juice, and lime. Two different appetizers, selected by the chef, followed. The Scallop Aguachile was subtly sweet and tangy, with carrot leche de tigre, tomato, cilantro, avocado, and grilled pineapple. At the same time, the Conch Aguachile was vibrant in a beet marinade with cucumbers, cilantro, tomatoes, and jalapenos. Both are served with house-made corn and crispy cassava chips. In anticipation of our main course, we refrained from devouring them both!

Our plat du jour includes a thick beef tenderloin steak grilled to a perfect medium rare, served with a creamy parmesan/truffle oil potato purée, wine au jus, and broiled mushrooms with broccoli. We also indulge in a beautifully plated dish of house-made ravioli stuffed with cheeses, spinach, grilled onions, and creamy mushroom







sauce adorned with succulent grilled shrimp. We savor each bite, and a glass of prosecco perfects the marriage of flavors. As if we were not well satiated, dessert was next on the menu, and the chef's choice was impeccable. Delightfully light and creamy, the Piña Colada Panna Cotta is my favorite type of dessert. Rich coconut/pineapple pudding, roasted pineapple, coconut, and mint compote are light on the palate and have the ideal level of sweetness and texture. Even the divine Pear and Dulce de Leche Donuts master the balanced flavors of brioche stuffed with sweet dulce de leche, cinnamon/cardamom sugar dusting, pear sauce, and crisp pear fresco with vanilla gelato. Perfecto!

Be it a private beach setting for a couple or small group, to an intimate dinner in the seclusion of the thatched pier pavilion, the talented staff at Victoria House will create a magical evening not to be forgotten. Spreading Love for the Garifuna Culture

The Garifuna culture is one of the most vibrant in Belize. It is characterized by a deep appreciation for music and dance and a strong commitment to preserving its heritage. The Garinagu celebrate their authenticity daily, sharing rhythms from their drums, showcasing the movements of Jankuno, and offering delicious traditional cuisine, all while proudly presenting their rich heritage to the world.

Emily Ramirez, a young advocate for Garifuna artistry, was born and raised in Peini, Punta Gorda. As a dedicated community member, she serves as both a teacher and the principal at St. Joseph Anglican Preschool. She is passionate about reading, drawing, sewing, gardening, and music.

Emily aims to preserve and promote her culture in an ever-changing society through a family-run gift shop. "In 2016, my family and I recognized the need to represent Garifuna culture in Punta Gorda's tourism sector, so we founded the town's first Garifuna gift shop, The Isieni Project Gift Shop, located on Victoria Street," she explains. The shop showcases various Garifuna-themed gift items, with a special focus on their original handmade Isieni Dolls, which have been cherished since their debut in 2014.

According to Emily, the Isieni Project Gift Shop is a labor of love, as the name suggests. "Isieni" means "love" in Garifuna, reflecting their dedication to celebrating Garifuna culture. Among its offerings, the shop proudly features its signature product: the original Isieni Doll. These beautifully crafted dolls represent the brown skin tones of the Garifuna people and are dressed in vibrant replicas of traditional attire. In addition to the Isieni Dolls, they provide Garifuna clothing in various sizes, allowing everyone to embrace and showcase their rich heritage.

To Emily, the Isieni Dolls are more than just dolls. They are a way to spread love and celebrate the beauty of Garifuna culture around the world. Inspired by characters from her book, "Garawoun: Magic Drums," which she wrote in 2013 and published in 2016, These dolls serve as a vibrant connection to our heritage. "We believe that by recognizing the beauty of Garifuna children depicted in art, literature, and the Isieni Dolls, our children can experience positive growth and a deeper appreciation for their culture," says Emily. The Isieni Dolls, with their cultural significance and educational value, are a unique way to learn about and celebrate the Garifuna culture.

The Isieni Project Gift Shop warmly invites everyone, regardless of age or background, to celebrate and embrace Garifuna culture. Whether through the simple act of cherishing a doll, enjoying the rhythmic beat of a drum, or appreciating the vibrant beauty of traditional attire, there's something for everyone here. 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Las Posadas: A Cultural Christmas Journey

There are many ways to celebrate the Christmas holidays, ranging from warm family gatherings to attending religious Mass. From decorating our homes to planning a big family dinner, the entire month of December comes alive with Christmas cheer. Our cultural backgrounds often influence how we observe these festivities. Growing up in Northern Belize, in a predominantly Mestizo community, I found Christmas particularly special, as it is a celebration deeply rooted in Catholic and cultural traditions. One of the more traditional events leading up to Christmas is Las Posadas.

Starting on December 16th, the Catholic communities in Northern and Western Belize observe Las Posadas, which reenacts Mary and Joseph's search for lodging in Bethlehem. Over nine nights, this heartfelt tradition unfolds with prayers, hymns, and the warm hospitality of the neighborhood. A young couple carries statues representing Mary and Joseph each night as they visit different homes, asking for "posadas," or lodging. Accompanying them is a procession of rezadoras (women who lead prayers, often with





a strong emphasis on the importance of family and community) and cantadoras (women singing hymns, often about the birth of Jesus and the joy of Christmas).

At each home, the group outside sings to request shelter, while those inside initially refuse them. Traditionally, lodging is offered at the third house. The host family receives the statues, and after reciting prayers, they provide treats such as maja blanca (a rice porridge), conservas (fruit preserves), and horchata to those accompanying the procession. As children, this was the night's highlight, filled with anticipation and joy as we waited for the treats and the next house to visit.

On the final night, December 24th, the pastors (shepherds) present gifts to baby Jesus in the manger, completing the nativity scene.

Las Posadas is a beautiful celebration of our local cultures and reminds us of the meaning of Christmas and the importance of giving and sharing.

Yes, wee taak Kriol eena Bileez / Yes, we talk Kriol in Belize

Although English is the official language of Belize (thanks to British settlers and colonization in the 1800s) and is used in public education, government, and most media outlets, the country's default language in many households is Kriol (Creole). Belize Kriol specifically developed when enslaved West Africans were subjected to English-speaking owners; as a result, these people were forced to create a dialect using English as a base language. The Kriol culture remains a staple of Belize.

If English is your first language, you'll be surprised that you can usually decipher the meaning when pronouncing written Krio phonetically. Such as *Gud Maanin/Heloa /Maanin: Good Morning* and *Aftanoon- Good Afternoon*. Want to know more? Here are a few ways to familiarize yourself with our local language while having fun!

Chree Fon Wayz Fi Laan Kriol / Three fun ways to learn Kriol

Kuchriments: A Bileez Kriol fusion weh bring langwij, pipl and kolcha tugeda (*A Belize Kriol fusion where we bring language, people, and culture together*).



The late Leela Vernon was awarded the title "Queen of Brukdown," by the Order of the British Empire for her contributions to preserving the Kriol culture and music.



Belizean Andrea Rodriguez and her husband founded Kuchriments, a Kriol take on the word 'accoutrements', meaning odds and ends and personal accessories. Using a standardized method of spelling Kriol, Andrea found creative ways to share traditional expressions in stylish and fun ways. From a monthly calendar (2025 coming soon) featuring Kriol expressions, translated and explained in English, to a Kriol word search book, scripture cards, tote bags, coffee mugs, and more, all are adorned with charming Kriol sentiments. 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
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"Weh Yuh Di Seh?" Card Game / What do you say? Created by Destiny Wagner, Miss Earth 2021

Chravl buk eena Kriol ahn Inglish is a travel book in both Kriol and English and contains common phrases used in Belize. Thirty-six short chapters cover a range of topics/scenarios, including Useful Expressions, When You Meet Someone, When You Ask for Help, Numbers, When You Go Shopping, and more; it's fun and useful for Belizeans and visitors. Even if you aren't trying to speak the language, it can help you learn to understand what is being said. All Kriol speak and understand English too. The book was published in 2005 by the Belize Kriol Project and SIL International and is no longer in print. Spotlight on: Garifuna Settlement Day



Every November 19th, Belize celebrates one of its most vibrant cultural groups, the Garifuna. Garifuna Settlement Day is one of the largest and most celebrated national holidays, heralding the arrival of the Garinagu people to Belize after their exile from St. Vincent in the early 1800s. The Garinagu traveled via dugout canoes and landed on the shores of Southern Belize in places like Dangriga, Hopkins, Seine Bight, and Barranco (Toledo). About seven percent of an estimated 500,000 Garinagu worldwide live in Belize. They are descendants of two ethnic groups, Carib Indians and Black Africans, who lived on the island of St. Vincent.

Their cultural contribution to Belize was recognized in 1977, when under the leadership of the late Premier, the Right Honorable George Price, November 19th was declared a public and bank holiday honoring their arrival to the country. Traditionally, activities commence on November 15th with drumming sessions, and the Yurumein on the 19th is a colorful sunrise re-enactment of the Garinagu people arriving in boats to the shores of Belize in 1832.

This year's Garifuna Celebrations theme is "Afeduha waméi wagücha, afareinha waméi wanichigu - Celebrating the roots of the Garifuna culture!" It highlights traditions and values that have shaped the Garifuna community, emphasizing the vital role of passing down knowledge, values, and experiences to future generations. The week-long celebration includes parades, live music, drumming, dancing, and prayers.
