Family Travel: Horseback Riding at Green Acres Ranch

The expansive Green Acres Ranch, located within the lush panorama of the Cayo District along the Hummingbird Highway, offers a variety of family-oriented activities. Their jungle horseback riding tours accommodate all levels of riders, from novice to cowboy! Before the tour, friendly wrangler Emilio and the team welcome you, assess your comfort level, explain basic riding skills, and show you how to communicate with your trusty steed. Youngsters must wear helmets, but they are available to all riders. Once orientation is complete, you are

Led by a team of attentive riding professionals who are certified BTB tour guides as well, the two-hour ride takes you through citrus orchards, grassy fields with grazing horses complete with adorable foals, ranchland dotted with cattle and white Brahma bulls, travers lively rivers, and immersed within misty mountains and thick jungle. offers a picturesque snapshot of Belizean landscapes. Riding in a single file, Emilio spends time with each rider, assuring all is well while sharing anecdotes of ranch life and pointing out areas of interest. With a roaring waterfall as a dramatic backdrop, Emilio orchestrates photo ops, memorializing the adventurous day.

In keeping with family-oriented activities, the long-established Green Aces Ranch also offers an informative walk and talk through their citrus orchards, where guests gain a greater appreciation of what farmers bring to the table and learn about organic farming. They can even plant a citrus tree! They also offer a super fun Tractor Trailer Adventure ride through the scenic ranch and beautiful vistas within the valley of the Sleeping Giant. The journey includes indulging in fresh farm fruit, or you can arrange a complete picnic lunch next to the creek under giant shade trees. While savoring a tasty lunch, guests can enjoy wading the creek and marvel at the many birds in the area, all the makings of a memorable family experience.

New to their family-oriented activities is the Mennonite Carriage rides. Enjoy a one-hour farm loop ride through the fields and orchards. The nostalgic carriage ride is perfect for non-riders traveling with horseback riders.

Reef Fishing

Just about any place you stay within the country, chances are fishing is offered. Be it river fishing, deep sea, or reef fishing, there's something for everyone. For families with budding anglers, a half day on the water reeling in fisty reef fish is grand fun. Full and half-day trips can easily be arranged along the coast with local tour operators. With the close proximity to the Meso-American Reef, guests staying on Ambergris Caye or Caye Caulker can spend an afternoon reeling in huge smiles and fish aboard a hired boat with a skilled guide.

All equipment needed is usually included, with fully rigged fishing gear, plenty of bait, and beverages such as water and soda. Best of all, your guide knows where the fish are while staying on the beachside of the reef, where the seas are calmer. They are happy to help youngsters (and adults) with the equipment, even baiting your hooks, casting your line, and removing your catch if needed. Essentially, all you need to do is reel in your catch! On a good day, you can come home with more than a dozen fish, ranging from snappers, grunts, mullets, and even barracuda.





The fun doesn't end on the boat for young anglers hungry to savor their catch. Guides can be asked to clean and even fillet your catch once you return to shore. With fresh fish in hand, many beachside restaurants will gladly prepare your day's catch, complete with side dishes of your choice. After an exciting day and a belly full of fresh fish, your tired little fisher folk will sleep well, with visions of flapping fish dancing in their heads. It's not every day that a family can share an experience like this; chances are the memory won't soon be forgotten.

Your hotel concierge can help you arrange your fishing trip.





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Sometimes, getting youngsters interested in historical sites can be a challenge. Still, with a bit of "homework" before your trip, you can fuel their imagination with the legends of the mystic Maya. Youngsters who learn about this ancient civilization will likely be captivated by stories about their impressive pyramid-building skills, complex calendar system, intricate hieroglyphic writing, and fascinating gods while learning about their daily lives. Even the Maya's unique beliefs and rituals, including their agricultural practices and the use of cacao beans, can be captivating. A simple search online or at your local library should produce a large variety of reading options for all age ranges, such as Maya History for Kids- Captivating History, Ancient Maya Daily Life - Heather Moore Niver, and Heart of a Jaquar – Marc Talbert, to name a few.

Now that your fledgling adventurer is ready for some real-life action, there are several Maya archaeological sites to explore in Belize. Some are more accessible than others, so if you're traveling with young ones, you may choose the more "user-friendly" sites for families. The smaller size of the compound ensures less time for tired legs or waning attention spans. Wherever you are staying, the concierge should be able to arrange your tour.

Cahal Pech Archeological Preserve

Settled upon two acres of land on a mountaintop overlooking the picturesque city of San Ignacio in the Cayo District, Cahal Pech was once home to an elite Maya family. With evidence of continuous habitation as far back as 1200 BCE, it is one of the oldest recognizable Maya sites in Western Belize.

With over 30 structures, including temples, plazas, ball courts, ceremonial masks, and artifacts, the site offers a lot of interaction while exploring, like climbing stairs, going through cool tunnels, and traversing the maze of structures. Great for engaging a young audience! A tour guide is essential for sharing captivating information and stories about the area and, to spectators' delight, to spot monkeys and toucans in the above canopy.

This site is easy to access and has handy restroom facilities. Two hours is all you'll need to enjoy this jungle gem with your family.

Altun Ha

This Maya site in the Belize District near the Maskall Village is about 30 miles north of Belize City. The most prominent structure is the Temple of the Sun God's Tomb, also known as the Temple of the Masonry Altars. Despite its relatively small size (covering an area of about five square miles), this site was once a major ceremonial and trading center. Compared to sites in the area, Altun Ha is one of Belize's most excavated and restored locations, making it a favorite for tourists and visitors wanting to experience a true sense of ancient Maya civilization from centuries past.



The area around Altun Ha is rich in wildlife, including armadillos, bats, squirrels, agouti, paca, foxes, raccoons, coati, tyra, tapir, and white-tailed deer. Two hundred species of birds have been recorded in the area and spotting any resident creatures while exploring the compound excites children of all ages. The expansive compound takes a couple of hours to tour fully.

Going to the zoo is a given when you have children, but people of all ages love the zoo! Fondly referred to as the "Best Little Zoo in the World," the Belize Zoo is Belize's oldest wildlife rescue and rehabilitation facility. Resident animals are rescued, confiscated from the illegal wildlife trade by law enforcement, or transferred from other rehab and zoological facilities. Their habitats reflect the animals' natural setting and provide an immersive educational experience for visitors.

Today, the zoo cares for more than 150 animals, representing 43

native species. More than 60,000 people visit the zoo annually, and it is the only nature-based destination in Belize accessible to persons with physical disabilities.

The 30-acre zoo is located at Mile 29 on the George Price Highway in the Belize District, roughly halfway between Belmopan and Belize City and a half-hour's drive from the international airport.

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
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Carnaval! Paint, music, dance, and lots of fun!

This lively celebration, deeply rooted in Mestizo culture, marks the beginning of the Lenten season with beach parties, local food, live entertainment, and the burning of Don Juan Carnaval, which symbolizes the cleansing of sins. Carnaval is a family-friendly event that offers fun for all ages.

Join the festivities starting Saturday, March 1st, at the San Pedro Central Park Grand Street Festival. The celebrations continue from Sunday, March 2nd, through Tuesday, March 4th, featuring traditional dance parades known as "Comparsas." Participants also enjoy the unique experience of painting each other with colorful water and powder paint along Boca del Rio Beach Drive and downtown San Pedro. Sunday and Monday are recommended paint days for young children, as the atmosphere is more relaxed, making it perfect for family fun.



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

This day is geared more toward adult fun, so it's recommended that young children attend earlier in the day, especially before sunset.

The celebration concludes on Ash Wednesday, March 5th, with the traditional burning of Juan Carnaval. This act symbolizes the community's cleansing of sins and is believed to protect the island from misfortune during the solemn Lenten period.

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
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

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

During a recent visit, I was delighted to try their award-winning "Sweet and Spicy Thai Lobster Pizza."





Perfect for the beach, pool, or boat

From seed to swarm, beekeeper Shawla Leslie is the heart of

Farmed to Perfection







Tucked away in the sleepy village of Camalote, just five kilometers west of Belmopan, in the Cayo District, is the charming Farmed to Perfection, where magical things happen. The farm is one happy place, from harvesting honey and healthy products from the beehive to tilapia pools and gardens of bright flowers and herbs for the bees, rabbits, chickens, hogs, sheep, a few dogs and cats, and even guinea pigs.

Shawla and Desmond Leslie run the family farm, which began after Shawla attended a beekeeper training session in December 2021. The Child Development Foundation sponsored the one-of-a-kind program through the government of Belize, and now Shawla is one of the few female beekeepers in the country. After completing the training, she was to receive bees and materials to start her apiary. Eager to get started, she already had ten hives established with wild bees when the supplies arrived a few months later.

Shawla explained that beekeeping is an endless learning experience and that her products are not limited to honey. "There's a lot to learn about having bees and losing hives. It's how you learn from your errors; it is so intricate. I realized that the hive has many by-products inside, and I was amazed by that. I wondered why other beekeepers didn't do something with this. Why didn't they use the propolis (a mixture of beeswax and other oils and resins collected by bees and used in beehive construction) to create products using the wax and not just sell honey in a bottle? So, that's why I created products to show Belize that there is so much more in the hive. We don't create a product unless it is a by-product of the hive."

Once a beekeeper, Shawla began farming, starting with pigs, a cow, and sheep, and eventually growing to where she is today. Her honey business evolved into a line of custom-made goods made from beehive byproducts, including lip balms, ointments, facial scrubs, wood butter, and antique wax polish, to name a few. Shawla's creativity didn't end there; she has mastered a variety of delicious honey infused with coffee, garlic, anise, red pepper, spice seed, and cinnamon. She even sells honey from different areas with subtle flavors from that region. The "Belize in a Bottle" collection includes Taste of Camalote, Taste of Corozal, Taste of Cristo Rey, and Taste of Belize City. Of course, honey by the bottle or gallon is available too.

Their labor of love comes with a vision of sharing their skills

of simple farming with other Belizeans, and plans are underway to turn their acreage into a Learning Center. "One of the main purposes is to encourage others, especially Belizeans, to know that you can grow their own food, start small, and learn, especially since I am from the city...through trial and error, I've discovered essential skills, shortcuts, and strategies to build a self-sustaining lifestyle. I'm passionate about sharing this knowledge and empowering people to create their own slice of homesteading heaven, no matter where they live," Shawla explains.

Guests are invited to visit Farmed to Perfect, where their "Seed to Swarm Trail" grows within the warm embrace of the lush countryside. The onsite shop includes their honey products, yummy fruit syrups, beautiful purple Butterfly Pea Tea, and more. They are also constructing a visitor center and a new shop.

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Celebrate the spirit of the holidays by embracing Belize's Easter traditions

Every year, families worldwide celebrate one of the most memorable holidays of the year: Easter. While people's practices vary based on their cultural backgrounds and religious beliefs, one constant remains: the holiday is best enjoyed with good company.

In Belize, Easter is a vibrant event filled with exciting beach parties, sporting events, and entertainment for all ages. It represents a time of celebration and renewal, and Belize is no exception.

For many religious communities in Belize, Easter also marks La Semana Santa (Holy Week), during which they embody the true spirit of the holiday. Belizeans eagerly anticipate traditional events during this time, with the largest celebrations taking place in Benque Viejo, Orange Walk, and San Pedro Town.

From Palm Sunday (April 13) to Easter Monday (April 21), Christians across the country observe Jesus Christ's death and resurrection through a weeklong series of activities. While most religious observances

throughout the week consist of special masses or liturgies, the events on Good Friday are conducted on a larger scale and involve the entire community. These activities include the creation of sawdust carpets used during the reenact of the Passion of Christ.

Sawdust carpets are significant in Orange Walk and Benque Viejo del Carmen, areas with a predominantly Mestizo population. Each year, parishioners gather to create stunning artworks using colored sawdust on the streets near their church in preparation for the Good Friday religious procession. The process begins with a solid or uncolored sawdust base layer, often outlined with wooden frames. A light sprinkle of water helps to hold everything together. Artists then add intricate designs using sawdust, stencils, and various materials like flowers and fruits, resulting in a vibrant display on the ground.

Benque Viejo Town comes alive on Good Friday as residents commemorate the crucifixion and death of Jesus Christ through a reenactment known as the Passion of Christ. This event highlights the 14 Stations of the Cross and features a Holy Burial procession led by three floats, including a life-sized statue of Jesus in a glass coffin. The somber procession involves participants of all ages and is accompanied by the Benque Viejo Marching Band. While the Stations of the Cross in Benque Viejo is the largest in the country, other municipalities, such as San Pedro, also offer their own unique observances.





If you are in Belize during Easter and wish to experience our local traditions, you are always welcome to join us. Please note that Good Friday is a dry day, meaning no alcoholic beverages can be served or sold from midnight on Thursday until midnight on Friday. However, exceptions are made for resort guests and restaurants where food is consumed.
